AUTUMN LAWN CARE

This Autumn most lawns are in need of "A Renovation". Time spent tending your lawn at

this time of year will pay dividends next year.



Compaction, thatch, dead grass and a lack of nutrients will lead to an unsightly lawn unless you take heed and act now

Aerating A Lawn – Benefits

 Loosens compacted soil and increases the availability of water and nutrients.



- Enhances oxygen levels in the soil, stimulating root growth and enhancing beneficial bacteria in the soil to multiply and feed the grass.
- · Allows water to drain away from surface reducing the incidence of moss.
- Increases drought tolerance and improves overall health.

Scarification

- (1) Scarify to remove any moss and thatch, open up the surface and allow grass to breathe
- (2) Aerate using a mechanical aeration machine.

It also provides an excellent opportunity to over sow with a quality grass seed to improve the quality of the lawn.

Top Dressing & Over Seeding

In addition to aerating, apply a sterilised turf dressing (sand: soil mixture) to help keep the holes open longer, grass healthier and cover any seed sown.

Autumn Feed

Feed with a fertiliser high in Phosphate and Potassium with additional Iron for that dark green look.

Actions required in Autumn

- Scarify lawn
- Aerate lawn by machine
- Apply a turf dressing to improve soil and over seed to improve grass quality
- Apply an autumn feed

Some of these tasks may need some professional intervention.

would like to say a big thank you to the residents of the Eatons who joined 'PALs of the Pightle' and made a financial contribution which helped us to raise the £1,500 the trustees require to maintain the Pightle and apply for funding grants. Thanks to the community, we raised just over our target and have put in a bid for external funding. We are currently awaiting confirmation that our bid has been successful. Hopefully soon we can put up information boards with details of what can be seen and heard during the year.

Dog Poo is an ongoing problem in the Pightle, which appears to have increased over the last few weeks. It is the major complaint I receive from members of the public; a number of whom have said they will not take their children or grandchildren with them for a walk round the Pightle. This is unfortunate as it results in a section of the population being excluded from using the Pightle because of another group's selfish action. However, I can't say I blame them; there is nothing worse than stepping in dog muck and then having to get it off your shoes/equipment when you get home; it is not always possible to look where you're putting your feet.

Unfortunately we do not have access to a dog poo Fairy who will pick up your dogs mess for you, so we ask again that people take a bag with them (freezer bags are ideal, 50p for 50 from most supermarkets), please pick up your dogs mess and dispose of it in one of the two nearby bins. You can also purchase containers for a little as £2.00, which clips onto your dogs lead, ensuring that you never leave home without a bag.

On a lighter note, it looks like it may be a good year for blackberries; the fruits are forming nicely on the bushes and should be ready for picking by the end of August. Unfortunately I cannot get my children to help me pick them any longer, though they will still eat the results. Disabled Children's Access to Childcare (DCATCH)

The Cambridgeshire County Council Disabled Children's Access to Childcare (DCATCH) project is aimed at supporting parents/carers of disabled children in accessing suitable childcare; enabling them the chance of returning to employment and/or training. It is part of the Cambridgeshire Childcare Information Service (CIS). The aim of DCATCH is to highlight that "a child with a disability and his/her family should have access to the full range of childcare options that are open to other families" Sure Start, 2005

The aim of the project is to work closely with parents, childcare providers and professionals, embedding the principles of DCATCH; ensuring inclusion into early years and childcare settings for all. A referral service to parents shows where to go for support and guidance with their childcare options via the Childcare Brokerage Service. Once a family is identified we can then, through the CIS Childcare Brokerage Service, enquire about suitable childcare. This will include information on provision of childcare from providers, funding options, costs, specialist care and specialist facilities, if required by the provider.

Willow Bridge

(the bridge that joins the two oldest parishes in St Neots)

As you will have seen our new bridge is finally open and everyone can cross to Eynesbury without getting their feet wet in the winter months when the river floods. No longer will children have to wade across at the river mill and arrive at school with soggy feet or walk extra miles to cross at the Coneygeare bridge or even at the Town Bridge, thereby arriving late. So no more excuses for school children !

Of course dog walkers can now cross to the other side and explore the fields and Barford Pocket Park and people wishing to go to Tesco, the swimming pool or the leisure centre can cross the river safely without getting their cars out. The path is safe, lit and with a great surface so that mobility scooters can also access the other side !

If you have not already found the bridge why not go down Shakespeare Rd and find the access. It is there for all to use, though not for swimmers – we do not recommend jumping off the bridge for a swim – this is unsafe and if you do spot anyone jumping please let the police know on 456111. We do not want any accidents.

If you have wandered across and found that you cannot get down to join the towpath alongside the river we are assured that this will hopefully be sorted out soon.



St Neots Saturday and Sunday Riders Group

Local Volunteer Rangers from Sustrans organise cycle rides around our countryside monthly on Sunday mornings, a shorter ride on the 1st Sunday of the month and a longer ride on the 3rd Sunday of the month. Participation in the rides is free and fund raising is optional. The Rangers are just keen to encourage more people to cycle more often. Riders of all ages are welcome, though children must be accompanied by adults. The pace is easy so no one is left behind. Normal 10:30 prompt start from outside the Ambiance Café in the Riverside Park.

So why not get out your bikes, get them in good working order and head out for a Sunday cycle ride. Now that Willow Bridge is open why not explore St Neots - a new cycle map will soon be available from ESCA or the Tourist Info spot at Barretts.

Cecil Paget and his Cycling Capes

In the last few months more information has appeared about Cecil Paget and his cycling capes. John Cecil Paget was born at Bow in late 1871 and his father John was a canvas merchant. John Cecil became known as Cecil and in 1901 he was listed in the census as a rope and tent maker. Being a keen cyclist he travelled many miles and held several speed records.

John Cecil would have seen and experienced cycling in wet weather and it is perhaps not surprising that he developed a cycling cape and a range of wet weather gear including gloves, coats, boots, trousers and much more. There was even a range of colours ! He proudly stated in his catalogue that he was the originator of the cycling poncho in 1900.

In 1928 he arrived in Ackerman Street with his family and continued to sell his wet weather gear. In December 1941 John Cecil and his wife Verena left Eaton Socon but his son Cecil continued to live here with his wife Ida and their two sons went to Eaton Socon School. The connection with Eaton Socon ended when the boys left school in December 1954 and the family moved away.

Some local people were involved in the making of the cycling capes and can recall exactly how they were made.

Portrait bench by the bridge
